UPDATE: Imprisoned Baptist Pastor's Appeal Rejected - Forum 18 News

On October 3, the Sheki Appeal Court in Azerbaijan rejected Pastor Zaur Baleav's appeal to have his two-year prison sentence overturned. According to Forum 18 News Service, the head of the Baptist

Union, Ilya Zenchenko, said, "We are stunned at the result the court handed down. We don't know what to do. It is a tragedy for his wife and children. It was all over in two minutes. Zaur's son is distressed, complaining that there is no hope and no law in Azerbaijan. He is very young, but his emotional reaction is understandable." Pray the Holy

Spirit encourages Pastor Balaev, his family and believers in Azerbaijan. Ask God to use his testimony to draw non-believers into fellowship with Him.

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“THE SIN OF INGRATITUDE”

Why are our times of thankfulness to God sporadic and many times motivated only by what we want instead of what we have received?

When I'm sick I'm pretty much a baby and want everyone to wait on me hand and foot. I'm not a very good sick person! When I begin to get better, I am thankful that the illness is going away. After I am completely better, suddenly there is no need to be thankful anymore because things are ok. When we are sick, there is something wrong on the inside and it is revealed in the outside – we're sick on the inside and the outside.

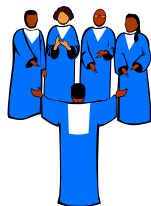
This is what Luke describes in his gospel account when Jesus was confronted by the 10 lepers who screamed out for him to pity them and heal them from their illness (Lk 17:11-19). Jesus did not even walk over to them but declared that they go to the priest and show themselves to be cleansed and all 10 of them turned and went. Only 1 of the 10 stopped, came back, and threw himself at Jesus' feet and thanked him for the healing he received. Jesus responds by asking where the other 9 are and then declares that this one man's faith has made him well. He was sick on the outside, as the other 9 were with their leprosy, and Jesus cleansed them. All 10 of them were also

sick on the inside and needed the healing power of the gospel that would make them well, not just an outward cleansing but an inward change of the heart, and only I received that.

As I sit here at my desk and the weather has begun to change and the deadline for my Trumpet article approached (Oct 15 for the Nov publication), I thought to myself I really need to write an article on thankfulness since this is the issue that will come up a few weeks before Thanksgiving. I know I am like the one man in that God has given His grace to me and made me well, but all too often my actions are like the other nine in that my thankfulness is temporary. Why should we be thankful only at one season of the year when we have been cleansed (outwardly) and made well (inwardly)? Why are our times of thankfulness to God sporadic and many times motivated only by what we want instead of what we have received? Perhaps it is because we are not as thankful as we should be and instead of constantly coming and falling before the Savior and thanking Him for what he gives, we are focused on ourselves and our own wants and desires.

The story is told of a devout king who was disturbed by the ingratitude of his royal court. He prepared a large banquet for them. When the king and his royal guests were seated, by prearrangement, a beggar shuffled into the hall, sat down at the king's table, and gorged himself with food. Without saying a word, he then left the room. The guests were furious and asked permission to seize the tramp and tear him limb from limb for his ingratitude. The king replied, "That beggar has done only once to an earthly king what each of you does 3 times each day to God. You sit there at the table and eat until you are satisfied. Then you walk away without recognizing God, or expressing one word of thanks to him."

As we approach Thanksgiving, we above all people have much to be thankful for. Let's respond by coming back to our gracious Savior and throw ourselves at His feet and thank Him for making us well.

GAZA STRIP

On October 7, 26-year-old Rami Ayyad's body was recovered near the Teachers' Bookshop where he worked in the Palestinian territory of Gaza. His body had stab wounds and bullet holes. According to Christian Broadcasting Network (CBN) News, Ayyad was kidnapped the day before by an unidentified group. CBN News quoted the spokesperson for the Palestinian Bible Society, Simon Azazian, who said, "We do not know the exact identity of the group, but we know he was martyred for his faith in Christ."

Ayyad told co-workers he'd noticed a car with no license plates following him. At 6 p.m. (on Saturday), his wife received a phone call from him saying he'd been taken captive by a group of people and would be home late. A second phone call relayed the same message." CBN reports Azazian wrote an e-mail message to co-workers which said, "Rami was the most gentle member of our team, the ever smiling one. He was the face of our Bible shop, always receiving visitors and serving them as Jesus would.

Please pray for Rami's family, for the team and all followers of Christ in Gaza. He left behind a committed team of servants of the Lord. Please pray for those who think that by killing us, they offer a service to God. May they come to know His love.

The hour of the ultimate cost of following Christ has come. Blessed be the name of the Lord."

Rami is survived by his pregnant wife and two young children. Pray the Holy Spirit comforts his family during this difficult time. Pray Rami's testimony will bring non-believers, especially his killers, into the knowledge of Jesus Christ. Ask God to protect believers in Gaza.

CHINA

Two House Church Leaders under House Arrest - China Aid Association

On October 1, the Chinese government placed two house church leaders, Hua Huiqi and Liu Fenggang, under house arrest. According to China Aid Association (CAA), "Each of their houses has been surrounded by two dozen police. Some Public Security Bureau (PSB) officers were even staged on top of Pastor Hua's roof in order to prevent anyone from coming in or going out. On October 3, eight PSB officers broke Hua and his wife's bedroom windows, and then cut off the electricity to their house." Hua Huiqi was released from prison in July after serving six months, while Liu Fenggang was released in February after three years in prison. Meanwhile, Hua Huiqi's 77-year-old mother, Shuang Shuying, is serving a two-year sentence. According to CAA, Shuang Shuying was recently beaten severely, received no medical care; she is now dying in her prison cell. Pray for Christians

in China who face increased persecution ahead of the 2008 Olympics. Pray God encourages and heals Shuang Shuying in prison.

SUDAN

Suicide Bomber Kills Youth, Wounds Others in Sudanese Church – VOM

On September 27, a suicide bomber in military clothing detonated a grenade, killing five youth and critically wounding four others, in Sudan's Upper Nile state. According to The Voice of the Martyrs' contacts in Sudan, "A pastor was having an overnight service in Khorfulus town, when an unidentified man walked into the service and detonated a grenade, killing himself, five children and critically wounding four others, including the pastor and his wife." VOM contacts added that the bomber was dressed in full military clothing, normally worn by government officials. VOM is assisting families affected by this tragedy during this difficult time. Pray God comforts and encourages the families of those killed. Pray for a speedy recovery for those injured.

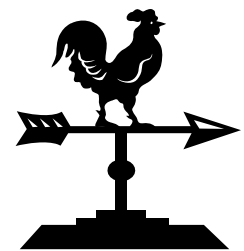

Associate Pastor's Article—Family Worship

There is no verse in Scripture which expressly commands the practice of family worship.

As we considered last month, corporate worship serves as the foundation from which family worship builds. The ordinary means of grace, including the preaching of the Word and sacraments, build up and unite the family in the common faith. Bearing this in mind, family worship reiterates what is being taught in the church. Historically, this discipline was practiced through Scripture reading, singing, catechism and prayer. Yet, before we discuss the form and practical issues involved, let us examine scripture for wisdom in incorporating this habit into our family life. In other words, let's see what the Bible says about it and why its important to even consider doing family worship.

Let me begin by saying there is no verse in Scripture which expressly commands the practice of family worship. Nevertheless, as we examine passages of scripture, it quickly becomes apparent that it serves as a wise application of what scripture does command of parents and the family. Let us consider 2 Timothy 3:14-17. This passage is well known for its emphasis on the inspiration and authority of Scripture. However, the broader context is to prepare the believer to face persecution. Therefore, Paul commends

Timothy to, *"continue in what you have learned and firmly believed, knowing from whom you learned it and how from childhood you have been acquainted with the sacred writings, which are able to make you wise for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus."* Timothy had been taught the truths of the faith from childhood. From childhood he had become acquainted with the sacred writings, the scriptures that are *God breathed, and profitable for teaching, reproof, correction and training in righteousness."* This text then explicitly teaches that as parents we must be teaching our children the truths of Scripture. The question and difficulty arises when we consider in what venue this is to take place.

This builds off of Timothy's "sincere faith" that first dwelt in his grandmother and then his mother. (1 Timothy 1:5). Timothy's faith had been passed on to him through the sacred writings. Granted this does not prove that we must do family devotions, but it sure makes a strong case for it. How else are we passing on the faith? In what ways are we digging into the Word with our kids. The Word of God is central to the Christian life, Paul makes that much very clear. Are we displaying this centrality of the Word of

God in our homes, or is it more of a passing Bible story when convenient? How do we expect our kids to be grounded in the Word if we are not teaching them the Word. Again, in the context before Paul reminds Timothy of the centrality of the Word, he says, *"in the last days there will be difficult times. For people will be lovers of self, lovers of money, proud, arrogant, abusive, disobedient to their parents, ungrateful, unholy, heartless..."* All of these sins, which our culture is saturated with, is what Paul says the living Word of God is able to address. For the Scriptures are *"God-breathed, useful for teaching, reproof, correction, and for training in righteousness."* Therefore, the Word of God must have a central place in the family. Family Worship serves as a wonderful conduit through which the Word of God can have this central place in the lives of our families at Redeemer. Although Paul does not institute family worship in this text, the value of family worship becomes exceedingly evident when we consider what Paul does command, namely to pass on the truths of the sacred writings to our kids in a day and age when they have fallen out of favor.

seek to serve as mentors to the young ladies in our youth ministry. Please pray for the Lord's blessing on this aspect of youth ministry.

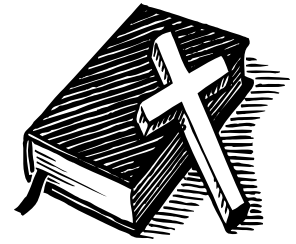

Evangelism Explosion

This is an edited excerpt of a chapter from a soon to be published book by Ken Priddy title, **The Silent Church: 39 Reasons We keep the Good News to Ourselves.** A phobia is a fear and we all have fears; fear of heights, fear of public speaking, fear of spiders, fear of confined spaces, fear of going to the dentist, fear of being found out, fear of failure, to name a few. In observing the American church, I have discovered a fear that is running at epidemic proportions; the fear of evangelizing; or as I have come to call it, evangephobia. This fear has paralyzed the

American church. Of all the national churches in the world, it is one of the least effective in evangelizing. I find this both tragic and embarrassing. Ever second of every day God is building His invisible and eternal church as He brings the world's lost men, women and children to Himself. In many countries, the Christian church is exploding with growth, and yet the American church, with the world's best-educated clergy, the world's most resources, and the world's most political freedom, declines. Why? The American Church is afraid to share it's faith, caught is a

sweeping outbreak of evangephobia. CAUSES OF EVANGEPHOBIA When questioned about their evangephobia, American Christians list many causes, but several are cited with great frequency. Some avoid evangelizing because they don't have the spiritual gift of evangelism, seeing this lack of gifting as a free pass on the responsibility of sharing the faith. Others shy away from evangelizing because they don't want to offend people. Some wrap the fear of evangelizing around another fear, the fear of rejection. (continued on page 7)

God's dealings with His people are often incomprehensible. His name to them is that which He gave to Manoah, "Wonderful," "Secret," "Mysterious."

That wearing sickness, that wasting heritage of pain, these long tossings on a fevered, sleepless pillow--where is God's love or mercy here?

But the silence and loneliness of the sickbed is the figurative "wilderness," where He "allures" that He may "speak comfortably unto them, and give them their vineyards from thence" (Hosea 2:14, 15), rousing them from the contemptible dream of earthly happiness, from the sordid and the secular, from busy care and debasing solicitude--to the divine and the heavenly!

Or, that unexpected affliction of poverty--the crash of earthly fortune--the forfeiture of earthly gain--the stripping of cherished treasure, and sending those 'nursed in the lap of luxury' penniless on the world--where is God's mercy or love here?

But it is through this beneficial, though rough discipline, that God weans from the enervating influence of prosperity, leading them to exchange 'the mess of earthly pottage' for 'the bread of life'--perishable substance for the fine gold of heavenly wealth and durable riches!

Or, that cruel blighting of young hope and pure affection--the withering of some cherished gourd--the opening of 'early graves' for the loving and beloved; holiest ties formed, but the 'memory' of which is all that remains. Where is God's kindness and mercy in creating bonds only to sever them? raising up friends only to bury them?

The plaintive experience and utterance of the bereaved mother in Israel, is that of many, "Call me not Naomi, call me Mara, for the Almighty has dealt very bitterly with me!" (Ruth 1:20)

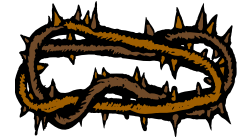
But the shallow rills are dried by Him, in order to lead to the 'great Fountainhead'. The links of earthly affection are broken, in order that stronger and more enduring ones may be formed above. The rents have been made in the house of clay,

only to render more inviting the eternal home in heaven--stimulating us to live more for that world where all is perfection--where we shall stand without a fault before the throne!

Yes, suffering Christian! believe it--your trials are designed by Him who sent them, to bring you nearer Himself! They are His own appointed gateways, opening up and admitting to great spiritual blessings!

The mother eagle is said purposely to put a 'thorn' into her nest to compel her young brood to fly. If God gave us no thorn--if He never disturbed the "downy nest of our worldly ease"--we might be tempted to remain grovelers forever! He knows us better! He loves us better!

The day will come when we shall joyfully testify, "Had it not been for these wilderness experiences--that protracted sickness--that loss of worldly position--the death of that cherished friend--I would still have been clinging to earth as my portion, content with the polluted rill and the broken cistern, instead of drawing water out of the wells of salvation!"

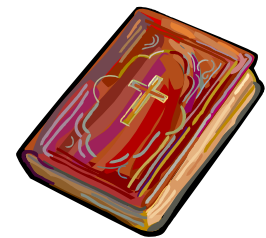
