GAMBIA – Missionary couple arrested in Gambia - VOM Canada

On Nov. 29, David and Fiona Fulton, British missionaries who have been working in Gambia for 12 years, were arrested for sedition. The couple was paraded on state

television and subsequently charged on Dec. 4 with writing letters that criticized the country and for publishing and distributing materials "with the intent to bring into hatred or contempt, to excite disaffection against the President or the Government of Gambia." David and Fiona pleaded not guilty to the charges and the case was adjourned until today. Sources close to the Fultons maintain that the couple

desires only to spread the Good News and that David's work as chaplain to the Gambian Army and Fiona's care of the terminally ill are not political. At last report, the Fultons were unable to secure bail and remained in detention.

David is being held at the high-security Mile Two prison,

“A NEW YEAR ... BUT THE SAME FOCUS”

2008 is now part of our past and 2009 has arrived. As I sit here at my desk in my study, I am looking at a beautiful desk nameplate given to me by Doris Smith before they left for North Carolina. The text on the plate is James 4:10: “*Humble yourselves before the Lord, and he will lift you up.*” That is a great text to meditate on as we begin a new year because it points us to the place where we must always be – humbled before the Lord. Humility is an understanding of your place in connection to another. As we stand before the Lord, like Isaiah, we see him for who he is and therefore see ourselves for who we are (Is 6). Isaiah is humbled as he stands before our holy God, and his posture displays that as he falls down. Humility conveys a sense of “lowliness” as the other is lifted up and we bow down. The promise from our great God is when we see him for who he is and ourselves for

who we are, He lifts us up. We are not lifted in the sense that we are equals with God, but we are lifted up in the One who was lifted up on the cross. Because of our union with Christ, he in us and us in him, we are now, as Paul says, seated with Christ in the heavenly realms. We are now lifted up! As we begin a new year, it is appropriate to return to a message from old – the gospel of grace.

In thinking back on 2008 and the blessings we have experienced at RPC, I can't help but being humbled. Our year started off with the retiring of the debt on our building, we saw an increase in our membership, we added students to Redeemer Day School, our men's and women's studies brought about our growing in grace, our EE teams were blessed with wonderful and meaningful visits, VBS attracted and instructed over 100 children, our mission focus was rekin-

dled with a trip to inner city St. Louis, we experienced the moving of the Holy Spirit week after week in our worship, and the list just keeps on going and going. In our estate of sinfulness and lack of humility, it would be easy for us to make a list such as this and be proud of all we did. BUT ... when we humble ourselves before the Lord and are lifted up by Him, we better understand the “success” we are so often driven by is not ours at all. The Spirit of the Lord is alive and well and we are experiencing a moving of that Spirit at Redeemer. God is lifting up His people as He brings glory to Himself. Ask God to give them strength and health while in detention. Pray that they will rest in the knowledge that Jesus is alongside them during this difficult time.

CHINA - Underground Christians Arrested – China Aid Association

House church Christians continue to be targeted and arrested throughout China, according to a Dec. 4 report from China Aid Association. More than 50 house church Christians gathered for fellowship in Xiji town, Zaozhuang city, Shandong province on Dec. 2 when Public Security Bureau officials surrounded them and arrested approximately 20 believers. The officials claimed that they would release the prisoners for 2,500 Yuan (approximately US\$27) each. On Dec.3, more than 50 house church Christians were arrested by local police in Tai Kang county, Henan province. At the time of the report, none of the believers had been released. Pray that these Christians will be released from detention. Pray that, like Paul,

their imprisonment will result in the advancement of God's kingdom.

NIGERIA – Six Pastors Killed, 40 Churches Destroyed – Compass Direct News

Following Muslim attacks on Christians in Nigeria on Nov. 28-29, six pastors are dead, at least 500 other people killed and 40 churches destroyed, Compass Direct News reported. More than 25,000 persons were displaced in the two days of violence, according to the National Emergency Management Agency. What began as outrage over suspected vote fraud in local elections degenerated into angry Muslims taking aim at Christian sites rather than at political targets. Police and troops reportedly killed about 400 rampaging Muslims in an effort to quell the unrest, and Islamic extremists shot, slashed or stabbed to death most of more than 100 Christians killed. Pray for peace in this area. Ask God to comfort the families of those killed. Pray the testimonies of martyred believers will draw their persecutors into fellowship with Christ. Pray believers in Nigeria will forgive their persecutors.

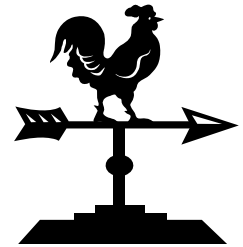
EGYPT - Christian Brothers

Falsely Accused of Murder - Compass Direct News On Nov. 22, Refaat and Ibrahim Fawzy Abdo, Egyptian brothers falsely accused of murdering a Muslim, were sent to the El Wadi El Gadid Detention Camp in an attempt to coerce them into confessing to the crime, according to Compass Direct News. The brothers were arrested after about 60 armed Muslims stormed the abu Fana monastery in Mallawi, Upper Egypt on May 31, where the brothers worked as building contractors. In the attack, a Muslim was killed, 4 Christians injured and 3 monks briefly kidnapped. The brothers were subsequently charged with the murder of the Muslim even though they were not in the area where the violence occurred. In the initial days of their detention, they were tortured with electric shocks 8 hours a day for 3 days in an attempt to make them testify that the monks at the monastery were armed. Pray that the brothers will be released and that the false charges against them will be dropped. Ask God to strengthen and provide for their families.

In December, the youth wrapped up their study on biblical manhood and womanhood. Most of all, we sought to look at each aspect through the particular lens of service to Jesus and self-denial. The greatest, most complete example of service and leadership is Jesus Christ, who emptied Himself for us, and who leads us perfectly and lovingly and graciously as Prophet, Priest, and King.

The girls looked at the various aspects of womanhood: women in creation, women in

the church, women as singles, women as wives, and women as mothers. Finally we covered the specific topics of dating and purity. Along the way, we looked at the various scriptural discussions of women's roles in the church and marriage, and we discussed our call to practice the fruits and gifts of the Spirit in the world, the church, and the home.

As we addressed the many aspects of God's creation -- dating, purity and sexuality, food, alcohol and drugs -- we learned that we will approach all of these things rightly, if we enjoy and believe that Jesus Christ is sufficient for us at all times and in all relationships. If I embrace that Jesus Christ is sufficient for me, I will enjoy His creation -- people and things -- as He intended, instead of misusing or manipulating people and

things into artificial messiahs.

It's the daily hope for all of us regardless of age: trusting in Christ and finding satisfaction in Him -- being filled to the measure with His goodness. *"And I pray that you, being rooted and established in love, may have power, together with all the saints, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ, and to know this love, that surpasses all knowledge, that you may be filled to the measure with all the fullness of Christ."* (Ephesians 3)

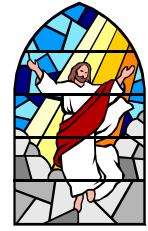
The cross of Christ was in Paul's view the grand consummation of all preceding dispensations of God to men. The cause of all spiritual blessings to our fallen race. The cross of Christ was the scene of Christ's splendid victories over all His enemies and ours. The cross of Christ was the most powerful incentive to all evangelical holiness. The cross of Christ was the instrument which was to subjugate the world to the supremacy of Jesus. The cross of Christ was the source of all true peace, joy and hope. The cross of Christ is the tree beneath whose shadow all sin expired, all grace lived.

Marvelous and irresistible is the power of the cross! The cross of Christ has subdued many a rebellious will—broken many a marble heart—laid low many a vaunting foe—overcome and triumphed when all other instruments have failed—transformed the lion-like heart of man, into the lamb-like heart of Christ—won and attracted millions to its faith, admiration and love!

What a marvelous power does this cross of Jesus possess! It changes the Christian's entire judgment of the world. Looking at the world through the cross, his opinion is

totally revolutionized. He sees it as it really is—a sinful, empty, vain thing. He learns its iniquity, in that it crucified the Lord of life and glory. His expectations from the world, his love to the world are changed. He has found another object of love—the Savior whom the world cast out and slew. And his love to the world is destroyed by that power which alone could destroy it—the crucifying power of the cross.

It is the cross which eclipses, in the view of the true believer, the glory and attraction of every other object. What is the weapon by which faith combats with and overcomes the world? The cross of Jesus! Just as the natural eye, gazing for a while upon the sun, is blinded for the moment—so to the believer, concentrating his mind on the glory of the crucified Savior, studying closely the wonders of grace, love and truth meeting on the cross—the world with all its attraction fades into the full darkness of an eclipse. Are not Christ and His cross infinitely better than the world and its love? *"But God forbid that I should glory, save in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by whom the world is crucified unto me, and I unto the world."*

New Year—God's Prevenience

I'm not sure if you're the New Year's Resolution type. Surely the practice of re-evaluating your life and priorities at this time of year can be beneficial, yet others seek to prevent further disappointment by abstaining from such a practice. It is not my intent to make a case for or against New Year's resolutions, but rather to address the notion of how we as Christians turn over a new leaf at any time of the year or in any stage of our life. Eugene Peterson has helped me to consider how we seem to have lost sight of God's prevenience in the Christian life.

What's prevenience you ask? Simple – God is always and everywhere “seizing” the initiative. In other words prevenience is, “God gets things going. He had and continues to have the first word. Prevenience is the conviction that God has been working diligently, redemptively, and strategically before I appeared on the scene, before I was aware there was something here for me to do.” Therefore, we can conclude, “In the magisterial Reformers, if God is prevenient in all things, then God is prevenient in our acts of knowing, and so our knowledge of God is rooted in God's self-

manifestation.” The point being that there is no true knowledge apart from God, and so God's prevenience bears on all of life.

Historically, much after the Reformers, this doctrine was linked with God's grace and regeneration. It was distorted by John Wesley who claimed God's prevenient grace is with us from birth, preparing us for new life in Christ. “Prevenient” means “comes before.” Wesley did not believe that humanity was totally “depraved” but rather God places a little spark of divine grace within us which enables us to recognize and accept God's justifying grace. Preparing grace is “free in all for all,” as Wesley used to say.

This “prevenient grace” is much different from a “prevenient God”. One tells us you just need to do it, try a little harder and be a good person. The other turns us to God, “for it is God who works in you both to will and to work for his good pleasure.” (Phil. 2:13)

The implications of this somewhat obscure doctrine are helpful for us to consider further. Rather than making necessary changes to be a better person, the doctrine of prevenience allows us to ask, What has God been

doing here? What races of grace can I discern in this life? What history of love can I read in this group? What has God set in motion that I can get in on?

Again, while the distinction is subtle, it is profound. Rather than having a “to do list” approach to our sanctification that we contrive based on our own assessment of who we need to be, let us seek to follow in step with God and what His Spirit will work in us as part of the Christian life. One is a very Arminian/Wesleyan, man centered approach to life's resolutions (at the beginning of a new year or any other time), even with good desires, while the other is a more God centered approach.

At the very least, a focus on God's prevenience benefits the believer by not looking for results and looking for God, or more appropriately, seeking to follow Him. “For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them.” (Eph. 2:10) Bearing this in mind, happy new year to us all.

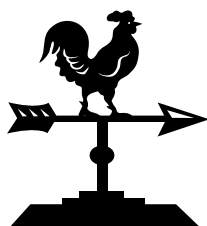
The reason for the rooster...

Session Report

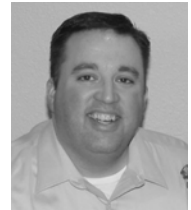
Diaconate Report

Report from the Building Committee

Building Committee progress has been slowed considerably during December. The City of McKinney has been doing an in-depth review of our plans and has required that several issues be resolved before we can proceed further. The most difficult issue has been an apparent conflict between the Craig Ranch requirement that we build to within 2 to 6 feet of our property line and a requirement from CoServ Electric that we maintain a safe offset from their power poles and lines that run along Alma Road next to

our property line. We have been working hard with our architects to develop a plan that will be acceptable to everyone involved.

As things currently stand, the earliest we can obtain approval from the City of McKinney is at their January 13 Planning and Zoning Committee meeting. At that point we will be able to solicit bids from candidate builders and once that process is complete, we can finalize arrangements with the bank. If things proceed as we hope, we may be able to break ground in February. The silver lining in this dark cloud

is that some material costs have dropped as a result of the economic downturn.

Please keep the work of the Building Committee in your prayers. We are aware of 2 other ongoing major church building programs that have encountered long delays with the City of McKinney. Pray that we can reach resolution with the city staff and proceed forward with the facilities we desperately need in order to serve God in this community.
